WHAT A HOMECOMING

Max Bird's letter to the editor in last week's issue of the Sentinel on what the returning veteran found when he came home hit the nail squarely on the head. So far here he has found neither a job awaiting him nor a house to live in. For two years now we have done a lot of talking about post-war planning, but so far as we know there is not a single project that has reached even the blue print stage.

Our prime interest in the concern was that we could launch a reasonable improvement program and so doing would provide employment. Post-war planning would therefore serve a dual purpose. Even the most advanced planners were caught short by the sudden ending of the war. No project is ready and even if it were, materials would be difficult, if not impossible, to obtain.

To the veteran, all of the magnificent planning municipalities have done so far sounds just like that much hot air. Despite the fact that we have made little or no effort to help ourselves, we sometimes become impatient at the reconversion progress made by congress. The question we must decide is whether we are going to help ourselves or whether we shall ask congress to do it for us.

You don't like federal bureaucracy? Neither do we, but if local government stays in the hands of local people, the people must make an effort to do something about it. If states rights are returned to the states, the states must be in position to accept the responsibility.

Now that it can be told, the principal reason that the federal housing administration was washed up on us was because we dilly-dallied several months before we could make up our minds as to whether or not the town wanted the row type houses. We could have asked and would have probably gotten the forty federal units twelve months before we did and instead of being only four percent completed at the end of the war, they would have been 100 percent completed and would have been located in one spot to be used until the emergency was over.

IN THE NAME OF THE VETERAN

The public has been warned to be on the alert for rackete developed under the guise to aid the returning veterans. One quick way to determine the worthiness of the enterprise is to have merits of the proposition investigated by a local group. We feel sure that any local veterans organization will be glad to cooperate by assisting in any sort of an investigation, which would stop the launching of any sort of questionable enterprise at its source.

This week a Portland solicitor canvassed advertising for a veteran's magazine, published in Portland. We do not know how successful he was here, but imagine he took out several dollars worth of advertising on the theme of aiding the veteran.

The proposition seemed to us and when he called at this office and asked for advertising, we told him we would consider the proposition if he would first get the endorsement of either the American Legion or Veteran of Foreign War posts. He grew angry and gave us to understand he had recommendations and he did have one, from Portland.

The Portland enterprise may have been worthy, but it's poor selling psychology for the salesman to get angry when asked for local references.

Cut Poppies

Orders from the Post Office Department specifically state that delivery of mail must be suspended in districts where sidewalks are dangerous until such time walks have been made passable without danger to the carrier.
