TOP MEN IN ARMY

WASHINGTON — President Truman Tuesday announced major shifts in the top command of the armed services, with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower replacing Gen. George C. Marshall as army chief of staff and Adm. Chester W. Nimitz replacing Adm. Ernest J. King as chief of naval operations.

Gen. Joseph T. McNarney will relieve Eisenhower as commander of the United States forces in Europe and of the American occupation army in Germany.

Nimitz, now commander of the Pacific fleet, will be succeeded by Adm. Raymond D. Spruance.

Eisenhower will take over as army chief of staff almost immediately.
