The ceremony was read at the parsonage of the Presbyterian church, with the pastor officiating.

The couple were attended by the bride's cousin and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Endres of Laguna Beach, formerly of Junction City.

PFC Moody is stationed at San Diego, awaiting discharge from service and his wife is stationed in San Francisco. Both expect to be home in Cottage Grove in January.

Ben Chilson went to Eugene

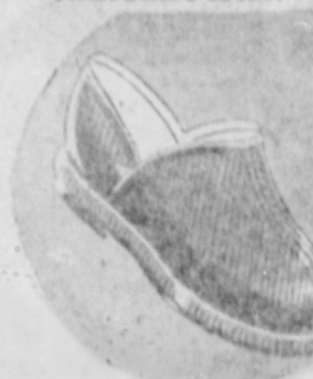
Wednesday to submit to an operation.
