Johnson went through center for the extra point tying the score. On the third play after receiving the Grizzly kickoff Gordon Neideigh shot a pass to Virgil Newton that was good for 51 yards and a touchdown. Gordon Neideigh went around right end for the point putting the Lions out in front 14-7 at half time.

Grizzlies Start Drive
McMinnville started a drive from their own 48 early in the second half. On three plays they had driven to the Grovers' 40 and four more took them to the 26 where Halfback Jim Donnelly broke over center and went all the way for the score. Johnson was stopped short on the try for point leaving the Lions in the lead 14-13.

Early in the fourth period, however, the McMinnville eleven took the lead for the first time. Kenny Johnson drove over from the one-yard line after the Grizzlies had driven from their own 33. Allison went around right end for the extra point, giving the Grizzlies a 20-14 margin with two and one-half minutes remaining in the game.

Then the Grovers started the drive that tied up the ball game and could have given them a victory had the extra point been good.

Both teams showed powerful T-formation offense and good defensive work. The teams were very evenly matched and both were putting everything they had into the game.

George Allison stood out for the Grizzlies. Besides doing an excellent job of quarterbacking he displayed superb passing and running.

The Grovers shifted some of the offensive weight that is usually carried by their fullback, Noel

Campbell, to Quarterback Gordon Neideigh. He threw one touchdown pass and another that set up a touchdown besides making several successful running attempts.

Few Substitutes

Neither coach did very much substituting for fear of weakening his team. Cuffel who replaced Donnelly on occasion was the only Grizzly sub, and Spud Campbell, replacing Newton and Jack Ross, replacing Lionberger were the only Lion substitutes.
