NEWSPRINT SHORTAGE

The paper shortage, particularly newsprint, may be the war's worst hangover in the reconversion period. The prospect of less newsprint has newspaper publishers worried over the outlook for the next few months. General opinion is that the situation won't improve before late spring because Canada supplies the bulk of the newsprint to the United States. Pacific coast paper mills are down to a small percent of the normal output and should further labor difficulties develop, the supply might be shut off altogether.

So don't be surprised if the size of your newspaper is reduced.

Because of the war Christmas lighting and Christmas decorations have been cut to the minimum in most localities, but there is nothing to prevent a more generous display of the Christmas spirit this year. New materials may not be available in quantities, but you can use the materials at hand.

Kleitman, of the University of Chicago, gives in Science (May 18, 1945) the results of a study of adult movie fans. He concludes that attending moving picture shows, which is looked upon as relaxation in the sense of escape from the humdrum reality of existence, is by no means relaxation in the physiological sense. Muscle tension is increased during such performances.
