for heroic service in Siapan, Tinnian and Iwo Jima. At present he is doing guard duty at the marine base in San Diego, California.

The commendation read for service set forth in the following citation:

"For excellent service in the line of his duties as a telephone lineman of a forward observer party of a Marine artillery battery in action against the enemy on Iwo Jima, Volcano Islands, from 19th of February to the 6th of March, 1945. Landing with an assault infantry battalion over beaches covered by heavy enemy shellfire. Private Duley performed his assigned duties in an excellent manner greatly aiding the establishment of communication from his party to the artillery battalion. At times when wire communication was not being used he stood watches as radio operator and proved his skill in this capacity as well as a telephone lineman. Throughout the operation until wounded and evacuated on March 6, he continuously repaired and maintained telephone lines to his party. Although working under heavy enemy mortar fire and sniper fire he was able to maintain communication with the fire direction center and greatly aided his party in giving artillery support to the assault unit. His tireless devotion to duty was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Mail Christmas Cards First Class

Christmas cards: Many advantages will result if you mail your holiday greeting cards at first-class rate; sealed for three cents with which you may enclose messages or letter, not permitted otherwise when mailed at third-class rate for .01 1/2c.

When sent first-class they are dispatched and delivered first, given priority service, can be forwarded and if undelivered will be returned to sender providing sender's name and address is shown on the envelope. On the other hand, greeting cards mailed in unsealed envelopes at the third-class rate of .01 1/2c which can not be delivered as addressed because addressee has moved or for any other reason, then such third-class mail is destroyed as waste thereby causing disappointment, as greeting cards mailed at third-class are not entitled to the free forwarding privilege accorded those mailed in sealed envelopes at first-class rate and, consequently the senders in many cases never know the greeting cards were not received by the addressee. This would not occur if greetings were mailed sealed at first-class rate with your return address shown on the envelope. Your co-operation by mailing early in the manner above will mean better postal service for you.

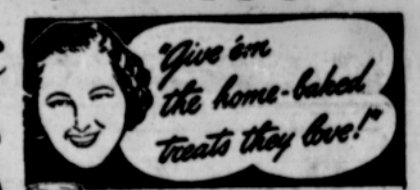

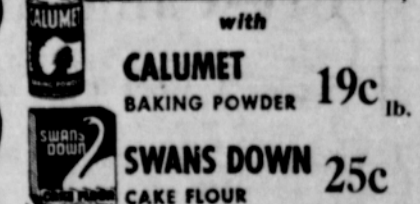
