OSC RESEARCH SEEKS USE FOR LIGNIN IN PLASTICS

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Attempts to use the lignin, which is a by-product of alcohol manufacturing from wood as is planned at the Springfield, Ore., plant, in making desirable plastics have proved unsuccessful so far, according to a technical report of the studies published in a recent number of "Pacific Plastics."

This report was prepared by Robert D. Englert and Dr. Lee Friedman of the chemistry department, who are working on projects of the Oregon Forest products laboratory. These experiments are still in the early stages and are continuing.

The chemists have found that lignin resulting from the Scholler process of treating wood is greatly different from native lignin as it occurs in wood. It is hoped that commercial uses for lignin and other by-products of the plant may be found as a means of making the plant profitable as a peacetime operation.

RED TOKENS DUE DEC. 11

ELECTRONIC HEATER MAY BECOME FOOD DEFROSTER

A machine that will defrost foods in two minutes and in good shape for serving is now installed in the food industries department of the O.S.C. agricultural experiment station. This machine, a Mann-Russell electronic generator, was placed there for experimental work by the Northwest Syndicate Inc., of Tacoma.

Believed to be the only machine of its kind in use in a food industries department such as this, the new equipment opens up wide possibilities for research in frozen foods, blanching, cooking and other phases of food technology, says E. H. Wiegand, head of the department.

Food to be heated is placed between two metal plates of aluminum or copper where it is heated by the passage of electrons through it. The very center of the material receives as much heat at the same time as the outside. Latest models of the machine are approximately half the size of a household refrigerator.

Professor Wiegand sees possible use for this process in the restaurant business where foods could be kept frozen until minutes before serving, thus making possible their consumption when at their finest color and flavor.

MEN now in Army who reenlist before February 1 will be reenlisted in present grade. Men honorably discharged can reenlist within 20 days after discharge in grade held at time of discharge, provided they reenlist before February 1, 1946.

You may enlist AT ANY TIME for 1½, 2 or 3 year periods. (One-year enlistments for men now in the Army with at least 6 months of service.)
