## Joe Lewis To Be In Eugene Dec. 12th

EUGENE, Dec. 3 (Special)—Joe Lewis, world heavyweight boxing champion and one of the greatest sluggers ever to step into the roped square, will appear at McArthur court, Eugene, Wednesday night, December 12, in his final public appearance before defending his title against the challenge of Billy Conn.

Promoter Don Owen, who outbid Victoria, B. C., for Lewis' services, was forced to guarantee the "Brown Bomber" \$6000 plus expenses—but insisted that the great Negro fighter meet an opponent of his own selection, instead of the usual sparring partner. Owen has offered Buddy Baer \$2500 to come here for the four-round fight, a heavyweight Louis won from on a seven-round disqualification in May of 1941 in Washington, D. C.

The sports extravaganza, which will be supported by two six-round boxing bouts and two top-notch wrestling matches, will mark the first time in history that a world champion has fought in Oregon outside of Portland. Jack Dempsey, after losing his title to Gene Tunney, attracted 10,000 fans in the same university pavilion for a similar fight. That was in 1931.

Owen anticipates an equally large crowd, despite the necessity of setting admission prices at \$5 ringside, \$3.50 reserved, and \$2.50 general admission—tax included. Reservations can be made by sending checks or money orders to Don Owen, Eugene, or the Club cigar store in Eugene.
