Domestic Market Found Vital For Oregon Farmers

The safest course for Oregon agriculture seeking postwar stability will be to focus attention on expanding the domestic market under conditions of regulated competition, E. L. Potter, chief of the division of agricultural economics at Oregon State college, told the annual conference of agricultural and home economics workers at Oregon State college.

Oregon agriculture will be greatly affected by the volume of international trade, but this will be governed largely by forces beyond the control of the state, he said, hence the need for attention to interstate markets by Oregon growers who produce a surplus of every major commodity excepting hogs and sweet clover seed.

The annual conference, held December 11 to 14, was described by Dean and Director W. A. Schoenfeld as the most important in many years because of the vital adjustments in postwar agriculture and farm family living now imminent. F. L. Ballard, associate director of extension, emphasized the major responsibility that the Extension service has in assisting Oregon farmers and homemakers in making such adjustments and planning for sound future development.

In his address on marketing problems Professor Potter reviewed the findings of the marketing group of the postwar policy committee set up by the agricultural division a year or more ago. The complete report of this group as well as much other information and data will be considered at the statewide agricultural marketing conference scheduled for the college campus January 14 to 18.

"The postwar problems of marketing agricultural products will arise mainly from domestic and foreign surpluses that tend to depress prices below the cost of production of many producers," said Professor Potter. "Oregon farmers are particularly affected by such surpluses because the state depends on out-of-state markets for all major crops except swine and sweet clover seed."

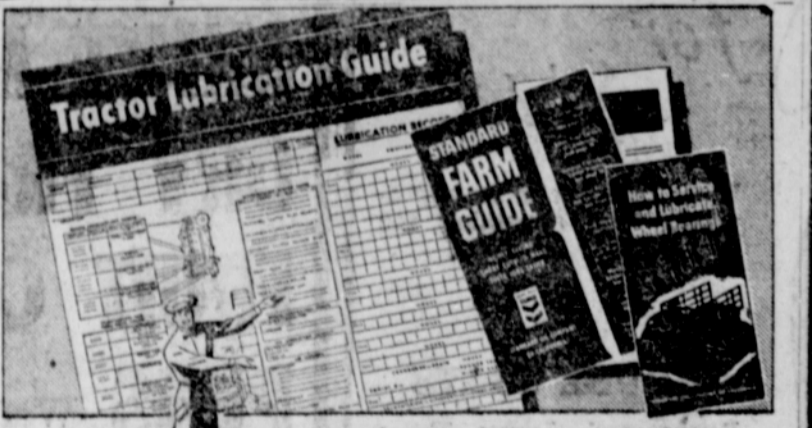
Among essentials to a sound marketing program mentioned by the speaker were reliable market information completely and honestly interpreted, information on sources of competition, knowledge of consumer wants, and continued research to assist in the production of high quality products at reasonable cost.
