Glen Humphrey of San Francisco has been spending a week or two with a friend he met in the army, Arthur Carlisle.

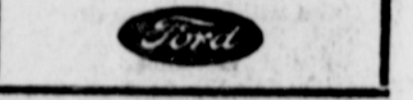
Tame, Wild Berries
