APPLE SAUCE FRUIT CAKE
An easy-to-make cake that will store for a number of weeks if kept in a cool, dry place.

GINGERSNAPS
Cream shortening and sugar together until light and fluffy; add egg. Stir in combined soda and molasses. Sift and measure flour, sift again with cinnamon, ginger and salt. Blend well into creamed mixture. Chill about 1 hour. Shape dough into small balls between palms of hands. Place balls on lightly greased cookie sheet about 1 1/2 to 2 inches apart. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 15 to 18 minutes, or until done. Remove to rack and cool. Makes 2 to 6 dozen cookies.
