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HERE'S YOUR TRAFFIC REPORT, DOC.

Elsewhere in this issue there is a timely letter from Guy Smith for the city police force on the traffic hazard of the holidays. This hazard is always with us. Unfortunately we have another problem too, that of finding a convenient parking place.

The other evening at a meeting a local merchant expressed a fear that there would be a fatal traffic accident at the Jefferson school before the close of school, unless more precaution is taken, and we don't want this to happen. The city has signs ready to erect both at the grade and high school, but it's still up to the motorist to drive wisely and sanely.

We have heard several times that the high school student drivers have a very good warning system, which prevents effective work from the police department when the city police car is watching the traffic at the high school intersection. What we are afraid of is that some day a high school driver and a log truck will meet at the high school intersection and the high school driver is likely to come off second best, which won't be good either.

About our parking problem, there is no doubt but that the majority of the business men want to keep trade coming here. In normal times we have heard a lot of beefing because some trade went to nearby towns. To our mind the best way of keeping the trade at home is to provide a convenient parking place for the rural people as well as a stock of merchandise to choose from. Of course we realize that it has not been possible to obtain a normal stock of goods for the past two or three years and merchandise is still scarce, but it won't be this way forever.

The only solution to the parking problem is for the merchants and business people to park their cars away from the congested centers including Main streets and a block each way. We heard of one city, where the officials threatened to publish the names of the offenders after due warning was given the offenders and the threat proved effective. Police say they hesitate to give courtesy tickets, since the number is likely to be surprisingly large. Several months ago the traffic committee and the police department conceived the idea that three parking lots could be secured and the business people persuaded to park on these, but the idea finally fell through after the lot owners refused permission to use the vacant lots. Probably the business people would not have used them anyway, but we thought the idea was a good one at the time.

Now it's up to the business people who drive to work to cooperate and park their cars at least a block from Main or else the police to enforce the one hour parking.

THE TRAFFIC SITUATION

Cottage Grove has the distinction of being one of the few Oregon towns with an excellent record insofar as traffic fatalities are concerned. We are very thankful for this. But the Grim Reaper is ever-present when the automobile is carelessly used.

Now that the war is over, many of us feel like kicking up our heels and cutting a few capers with the "old bus," just to see if she will still "do her stuff!" You may take the word of insurance statistics—she won't! Your car isn't "as young as she used to be." Her tires are old, and can blow out under excessive strain—her brakes may not respond when most needed—in fact, everything about her has suffered from neglect during war years, and can be instrumental in causing an accident which might bring death or injury to you, or to others.

Let's all begin to use the automobile in the manner for which it is intended. Traffic rules and regulations are for the benefit of all those using the highways and streets of our cities. The driver who double parks, not only endangers his own vehicle and prevents the car next to the curb from leaving, but forces passing traffic to detour around him and into the lane of on-coming traffic. How many times have you mumbled something not so pretty about the fellow? And what about yourself? Are you guilty of the same offense? Then let's all do what we know to be correct, regardless of how the "other fellow" behaves!

However, it is because of this double parking problem that many people are going elsewhere to do their shopping. Merchants here are complaining—but how many of our merchants and their employees are guilty of "hogging" a parking space on Main street for the entire day? Main street has a one-hour parking limit for the benefit of those who come here to shop. They know that the law hasn't been enforced, concerning this limit, and it is very convenient to have the old bus handy when they get ready to go home. Then, suppose all of us begin parking at least a block from Main street so that our customers may take advantage of the added convenience, and courtesy.

It must be remembered that the "courteous driver" is the one who understands the basis for the laws and their proper usage—regarding other peoples' rights and privileges. Gunning motors, racing in "low" and "second" gear, twin pipes, noisy and defective mufflers, unnecessary tooting of horns, squealing tires—in fact, excessive noise in general must be eliminated. By doing any or all of these things, we are infringing upon the rights of others, and this is definitely not courtesy of the road. Infringement upon the law then becomes infringement upon the populace in general—and some people like to sleep nights!

Alcohol and gasoline do not mix! During the coming holidays many of us are apt to forget this, and may imbibe not too wisely but too well. Choice of alcohol, or gasoline, is left up to the individual—but don't mix them!

Traffic laws are for the benefit and protection of all, and will be strictly and impartially enforced.
