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TODAY'S GREATEST NEED

Now that 1945 has seen the close of the world's greatest armed conflict and the democracies have again emerged victorious (we might not be able to always say this) we ought to work as hard to preserve the peace as we did to win the war for after all preparation for wars start long before war is declared and the time to stop war is before it starts. ABOUT STARTING WARS

We have no desire to pick on the former first lady who recently said, "Russia hasn't started any wars." Nor have we any desire to pick on Russia. With all due respect to said lady and Uncle Joe Stalin, however, we think the facts of history shouldn't be tossed around so carelessly.

Russia has started wars—ask Finland. That doesn't make her unique, since many other nations, including our own in 1846, have been guilty of the same offense. But to keep the record straight it should also be remembered that Stalin's non-aggression pact with Hitler in 1939 helped set the stage for World War II.

During 1939 England and France had worked belatedly but desperately to prevent war by organizing a "Stop Hitler" bloc of nations around Germany, Turkey, Romania, Greece and Poland joined but Moscow refused. This refusal spurred the Nazis to go ahead with their own plans. Just one week after the Russo-German non-aggression pact was signed the Nazis rolled into Poland. And the Russians came in from the other direction.

Shortly thereafter Stalin's troops took over the three Baltic States and then attacked Finland when the Finns balked at the Russian ultimatum. President Roosevelt left no doubt that he thought Russia the aggressor.

That's the record, despite the good lady's views to the contrary.
