44.46 Inches Rain Fell Here in 1945

The year 1945 started out to be a dry year but ended up 6.60 inches above normal. Total rainfall for the year was 44.46 inches for 1945 according to the records at the Cottage Grove dam. The normal rainfall here is 37.86 inches. December 1945 was also above normal with 9.29 inches of precipitation against a normal of 6.88 inches.

In 1945 there were 88 clear days, 102 partly cloudy, 75 cloudy. Forty days of the past year there occurred light to killing frosts. The lowest temperature was 22 above, the highest was 98.

Farm Improvement Is Goal of FFA

Efficient farm operation through better management, completing postponed farm improvements, and replacing worn-out machinery and unprofitable livestock are major reconversion goals of the Lane County Farm Security program, announces Victor B. Kuhlman, County FSA Supervisor, Room 9, Postoffice Building, Eugene.

"Postwar adjustments as farm prices reach a more normal level, returning veterans and war workers are absorbed on farms, and completion for farm markets increases will make efficient production particularly important on family-type farms, in the opinion of the County FSA committee," said Kuhlman. "To meet these changes, farm improvements and replacements to put the farm on the best operating basis possible are considered essential."

FSA loans to veterans as well as new farmers in the county will stress farm management practices for sound operation, adequate machinery, better livestock, and farm improvements.

Farmers unable to secure credit service to start farming operations or adjust their present operations to postwar conditions may advise with the following County FSA committeemen: Max Nielsen, Rt. 3, Junction City; David J. Calvert, Rt. 2, Eugene; and Roy E. Corum, Rt. 2, Eugene, or secure information at the County FSA office.
