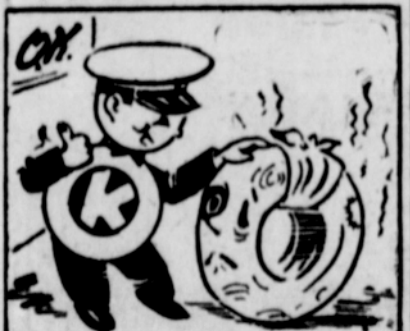

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MIRACLE OF THE TREE



Around a thousand years ago a Douglas fir of Christmas tree size was a thing of green and growing beauty in the wilderness of what is now Clatsop county, Oregon. Today, says Stewart Holbrook, that tree is "by all odds the oldest living thing in the Northwest." The company that owns the domain of the great tree now plans to preserve it as a primitive park. While the king of firs was yet young the early Christians of Norway were erecting timber churches designed on the pattern of the long-boats, or "serpent ships," of the Vikings. Today 20 of the churches of wood that were built in Norway in the 11th and 12th centuries survived in good condition. Substantial parts are left from 50 more. The finest, pictured here, is at Borgund and is a national monument. Its great timbers are black with age but are yet as staunch as the integrity of the Norwegian nation, which has endured invasion but now faces a free though hungry Christmas.

The ancient church stands, alive with the faith that built it so many centuries ago. The great tree of Oregon lives on, after a millennium of growth. Once upon a time it was akin to your fireside Christmas tree. And once upon a time the venerable church of Norway was a small, young tree of the forest, too. Therein is a truth of the miracle of life—the union of form and spirit that ever resists evil and increases good on the earth. Thus, men will build and trees will grow while earth endures.

Price Support On Eggs Announced Lower Trend Seen

The 1946 price support program for eggs recently announced by Secretary Clinton P. Anderson is designed to assure producers an average U.S. farm price of 29 cents per dozen during the flush production season next spring, according to announcements received by the O.S.C. Extension service. Price support operations will involve purchases by the government of dried, frozen and graded shell eggs whenever necessary to maintain prices. The surplus eggs acquired will not be dumped on the domestic market, Anderson gave assurance. Most of the purchases are expected to be in the middle west where prices are historically lower and where an average support price of 27 cents is contemplated.

The 1946 production goals for eggs suggest a 13 percent reduction in number of hens in laying flocks, and 15 percent reduction in number of eggs. Nationwide co-operation in culling laying flocks has been requested. Final disposition of surplus eggs will include sales for export, sales to other government agencies and transfers of eggs for school lunch purposes and for distribution to public institutions.

These and other government supports will check but not prevent a decline in the average level of farm prices during the next two or three years, according to the current agricultural situation and outlook circular issued by the O.S.C. Extension service. The general level of farm prices in 1945 was nearly twice the 1935-1949 average.

Assuming that funds are available, prices of several of Oregon's farm products are to be supported at not less than 90 percent of parity through 1946, 1947 and probably 1948. Such commodities include milk and butterfat, eggs, chickens over 3½ pounds, turkeys, hogs, wheat, potatoes, certain varieties of dry peas, beans and flaxseed for oil.

As of mid-November prices of these were at the following percentages of parity: milk, 109; butterfat, 103; eggs, 100; chickens, 120; turkeys, 131; hogs, 112; wheat, 99; potatoes, 102; beans,
