City Council Is Invited To Attend Ore. League Meeting

Mayor H. A. Hagen and the other city officials of Cottage Grove have been invited to bring the city's reversion problems to the joint convention of the League of Oregon Cities and the Oregon Finance Officers Association, to be held in Portland, January 21, 22, and 23, at the Multnomah hotel. The convention is planned as a "clinic" where outstanding financial authorities as well as federal, state, and local officials will be on hand to offer information and suggestions on federal surplus property disposal, return of airports to civilian management, planning problems, building codes, Oregon finance problems, and other matters of particular interest to Oregon cities.

Prominent guests will be Governor Earl Snell, who will speak at the opening luncheon on Monday; Dr. Harry K. Newburn, University of Oregon president, who will deliver the League banquet address on Tuesday evening; Carl H. Chatters, executive director of the Municipal Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada, scheduled to speak at the Finance Officers banquet Monday evening; Earl D. Mallery, executive director of the American Municipal Association, speaker at the Tuesday luncheon; Mayor Harley Knox of San Diego, president of the League of California Cities, speaker at the Wednesday luncheon; and Charles B. Bennett, director of the Los Angeles City Planning Department, who will speak at the planning and zoning section meeting on Monday.

Special section meetings will be held on subjects of up-to-the-minute interest to cities. The planning and zoning section will meet all day Monday, with exhibits and reports on current planning and zoning studies of The Dalles, Salem, Eugene, Corvallis, Portland, and others, and a critique of each by Mr. Bennett to be presented at the morning session. Mr. Bennett will speak at the afternoon session, and will then head a panel of experts who will discuss current planning problems and advise individual cities on their specific questions. Topics which will be discussed include: Location of parks, swimming pools, sewage disposal plants, schools, and highway routes through cities; civic centers and their relation to new federal buildings; zoning and industrial sites; subdivision control; off-street parking; public works programming; and city policy on tax-deeded lands.

The airport section will feature a round-table discussion of the development, financing, and management of airports and of the problems incident to the return of airfields to the cities by the army, navy, or coast guard. A representative of the CAA will be present to take part in the discussions. Other meetings are planned for attorneys, municipal utility managers, mayors and councilmen, and engineers and street superintendents.

FALL PIG CROP

The number of pigs saved in the fall season of 1945 (June 1 to December 1) is estimated at 35,144,000 head. This number is 12 percent or 3,904,000 head larger than the 1944 fall crop and is 14 percent larger than the 10-year (1934-43) average, but 26 percent below the record fall crop of 1943.

Dyeing Printed Fabrics

Dyeing printed fabrics is feasible and often produces highly desirable color effects. The print design—which cannot be removed—will show through even when dyed black. The resultant effect will depend upon the fabric and strength of the dye solution. Frequently a striking two-tone effect is produced. It is suggested that a darker dye-color be employed on prints.

Record Flood

waters are scattered everywhere. Several sections of the O. P. & E. Railroad were washed out also a trestle near Walden. Telephone service was out on several of the farmers lines and efforts are being made to restore service as soon as possible.

As far as can be learned there was no loss of livestock. Walter Post claims the toughest pig in the county. When he remembered the pig in its pen he could no longer reach its pen and figured he would find the pig drowned the next a.m., but when he went to look around after the water went down, the pig was squealing lustily for his long overdue meal.

Several residents living across the Row river from the Row River mill were stranded by high water when the bridge near the Humphrey grocery went out. The stranded families were supplied groceries when a cable was strung across the river and a big bucket attached to the cable. Later a suspension bridge was constructed.

Seven Deaths From Drowning
Seven deaths from drowning have been reported, but this number may be increased as the search is continued. Four miles west of Drain the body of Raymond H. Hill, 26, a recent discharged veteran, was taken from the flooded Elk creek on the Drain-Reedsport highway Sunday. Hill's body was found in the car and the body was taken to the Stearns mortuary at Oakland. Coroner Stearns reported that Hill had apparently drowned before the machine plunged into the creek. Sunday, also, the body of Mrs. John A. Mitchell was recovered from the flooded Salt Creek canyon above Oakridge, but the search continu-

ed for the body of her husband and two children. The Mitchells were enroute to California from Portland. Searchers were also hunting the body of Chas. S. Pounds, REA lineman, lost above Finn rock on the McKenzie river, who fell into the river while trying to run a line across the stream.

Efforts to obtain anything like an accurate estimate of damage suffered by lily growers could not be obtained yesterday. Growers who planted on bottom lands suffered heavily. Some crops were entirely washed away, others were partly washed out, while in some cases most of the soil was removed from around the bulbs.

Hardest hit was West Springfield junction around Glenwood near Eugene. Not a house or building escaped damage in this area. Some buildings are gone, even the foundations washed away. Others were moved from their footings.

Good work was done by Emory Harris, owner of the Harris mill up Mosby creek, when the flood waters were the highest on Row River. Mr. Harris took his lumber carrier to the junction of the Row River and Mosby Creek roads and assisted many stalled cars and trucks to safety.
