

New Nash Now on Display at Golden Rule Auto Service

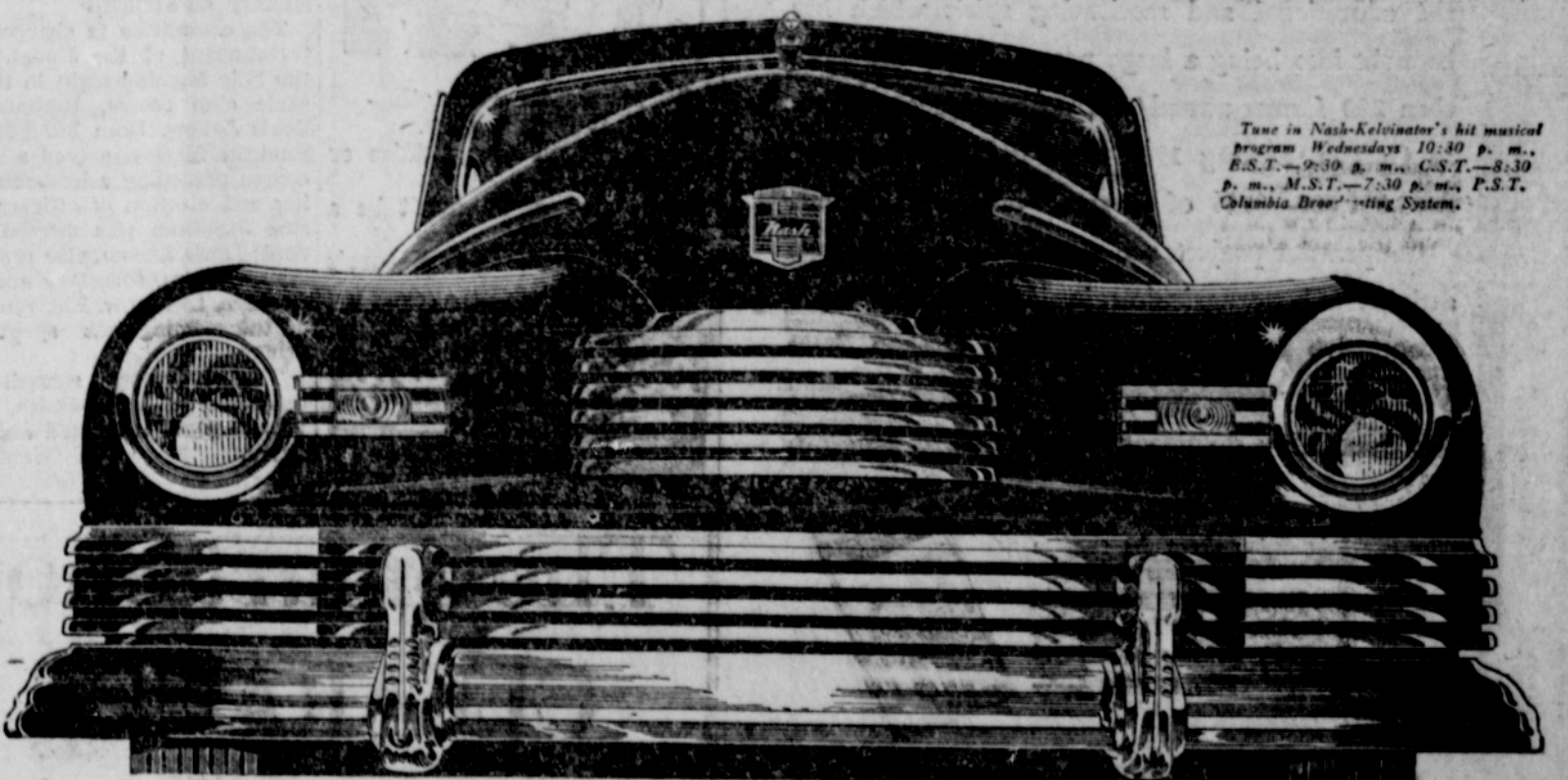
