Baby Chicken Output High

The output of chicks by commercial hatcheries during November was the largest of record for that month—27 percent larger than the output of November last year. Increases were general throughout the country except in the New England states where hatchings were under last year's November output. The demand for broiler chicks has lessened. A great many orders for broilers were canceled during the month. Hatcheries located in broiler areas now have a sufficient supply of hatching eggs to take care of the demand for chicks in these areas.

The production of baby chicks during November totaled 39,339,000 compared with 30,985,000 in November last year and 35,394,000, the previous high output of November 1943. The production of baby chicks for the first 11 months of 1945 totaled 1,561,922,000 compared with 1,251,355,000 produced during the same months last year.

Interest in chicks for delivery in 1946 has been good, with bookings for next spring heavier than usual. The number of chicks booked on December 1 for later delivery was 19 percent larger than the number booked on December 1 last year. The recommended goal for eggs produced in 1946 is 85 percent of the number produced in 1945, but is still 20 percent over the 1937-41 average. The recommended goal for chickens raised in 1946 is 83 percent of the number raised in 1945 and would provide for maintenance of flock sizes as at the end of 1946 at the same level as the 408,063,000 hens and pullets recommended for January 1, 1946. The difference between 1945 egg and poultry production and recommended 1946 production is accounted for by the reduction in military and lend-lease requirements.

How to cook the less tender cuts of meat
Braising, including pot-roasting and "stewing," is a favored way for cooking the less tender cuts of meat. Long, slow cooking with moist heat, either on top of the stove or in the oven, in a tightly covered pan or kettle is necessary to make the meat tender.

GOOD CUTS TO POT-ROAST
Though you most often think of beef in the role of pot roast, we like to cook lamb, veal and pork by this method, too.

BEEF: Heel or eye of round, cross-rib, round-bone, seven-bone, rump, chuck, neck, shoulder-arm, or clod. Buy no less than 3 pounds, preferably 4 or 5.

VEAL: Shoulder, boned or not as you like, leg, rump or blade.

PORK: Shoulder, Boston butt or picnic.

LAMB: Shoulder, breast or cushion.

THE SECRETS OF SUCCESSFUL POT-ROASTING
The trick in pot-roasting is to brown the meat first on both sides, rather slowly, in a little melted suet or shortening if the meat hasn't much fat. Then season with salt and pepper and add a bit of carrot, onion, parsley or celery for flavor and then add about a cup of liquid—water, soup stock, vegetable juice, milk, sweet or sour cream or diluted vinegar. Cover tightly and cook very slowly until the meat is so tender you can almost cut it with a fork. Add a little more liquid from time to time if the meat begins to cook dry. Allow 30 to 40 minutes per pound when cooked on top of the stove, or about 45 minutes per pound in a moderate oven (350° F.).
