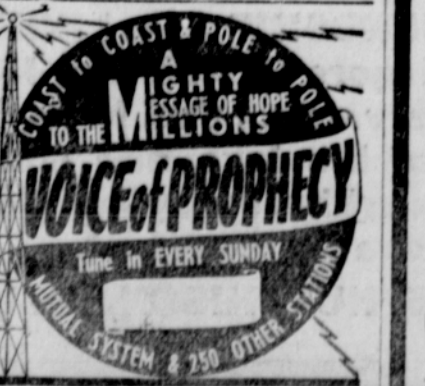

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Vets Wanting to Start in Poultry Offered Council

The best way for a returned veteran to get started in poultry business, if he lacks experience and capital, is to take a job as a hired man on a good poultry farm, says Noel L. Bennion, extension poultryman at Oregon State college. If he makes good as a hired man, it won't be long until he will have a chance to rent or buy a good farm, and he will have learned a lot about good management while working for an established poultryman, he says.

Many veterans and new comers to this country are showing interest in getting started in some phase of the poultry producing industry, Bennion finds. Many do not realize the amount of capital required to develop a successful poultry enterprise, however.

Exclusive of the land and home, it will require about \$5 per bird to build and equip a brooder house and laying house under present conditions, Bennion reports. Then one acre of range land will be needed for each 250 pullets during the growing period. At least two acres of land are needed for each 250 pullets raised so that a two-year rotation system may be followed.

If adequate land is not available, pullets can be grown in confinement successfully if not overcrowded. Under such conditions they need about two square feet of floor space per bird during the period they are two to five months of age. This, of course, means additional investment in housing space.

Veterans, newcomers or others planning to build or remodel poultry houses may obtain plans and specifications by contacting any county agent or the state college poultry department, Bennion says.

many mistakes are made in housing by using plans for poultry buildings not adapted to Oregon conditions.

Any veteran inexperienced in poultry production will find out by working for awhile on a poultry farm whether he likes working with chickens well enough to stay with it, Bennion concludes.

NAVY PAY HIGHEST

Comparison shows the average income of enlisted personnel in the navy to be the greatest of any branch of service.

That statement was made today by Thomas A. McGinnis, Chief Gunner's mate, U.S. Navy recruiter in charge of the navy recruiting station in this area, who asserted that proof can be found in a study of organization charts.

More than half of the enlisted men in the navy are petty officers, he said, while the large percentage aboard ship are seamen first class, or fireman first class. The latter two pay grades receive \$66 a month, which compares with the pay of a corporal.

Navy pay begins at \$50 a month, the recruiting officer said, with a top of \$138 a month plus extras, including five percent additional for every three years of service.
