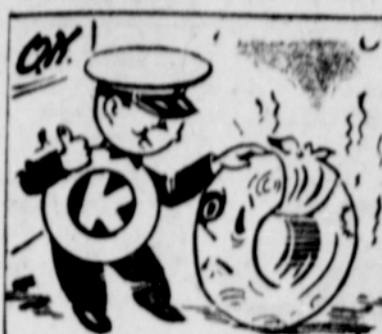




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SOCIETY

The Cottage Grove Lions playing on their home court defeated the North Bend Bulldogs 39 to 29 here Saturday night. The Lions holding true to form on their home court, played a good game all the way and definitely outplayed the favored Bulldogs.

Gordon Neideigh, Lion sharpshooting guard, opened the scoring after about a minute of playing time with a basket from the keyhole. Then Wilbur Heath and Neideigh teamed up to score 8 points before Massey of North Bend opened the scoring for the Bulldogs. With Neideigh and Heath still doing the scoring the Lions held a 10-2 lead when the quarter ended and pushed the lead to 17-2 during the second quarter.

The two teams played on even terms throughout the second quarter, leaving the Lions with 20-7 lead at the half time. The Lions averted their usual third quarter slump and scored 9 points to 10 points for the opposition, the closest they have held any school in that quarter. Little scoring was done by either team in the final quarter, leaving the 39-29 final count.

The Cottage Grove freshmen team came from behind to defeat the Colin Kelly high team of Eugene 28-27 in the final quarter.
