Mayor Hagen, L. W. Coier, George Matthews and Max Bird of the city council and Herbert Eakin, chairman of the planning board, attended the 3-day conference of the League of Oregon Cities which was held in the Multnomah hotel in Portland last week.

The first day was devoted to discussions, lectures and maps regarding city planning and zoning. There were also lectures and panel discussions on city financing, taxes and their application. The second day was devoted to lectures and panel discussions of special interest to mayors and councilmen, problems of the city engineer regarding water supply, sewage disposal, maintenance and construction of streets and also some very interesting discussions on construction and maintenance of airports. The entire third day was devoted to the discussion of similar subjects which are of interest to the various cities.

All the meals were taken together at which prominent men such as Governor Earl Snell and the president of the Washington League of Cities and others gave interesting talks dealing with the various problems confronting the states and cities. throughout the session. He stated that about 300 people representing nearly all the cities were in attendance.
