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Post-war Frozen Food Locker to Be Shown Here Feb. 7

National surveys made during the past few months indicate that there is unprecedented interest in frozen food lockers for farm and home use on the part of millions of families, according to Joe Short of Short's Plumbing Shop, who has arranged for a special "first showing" of factory sample models of freezers in their display rooms Thursday, February 7th.
