PARSNIP SLAW

FRIED APPLES

Try these with sausage cakes for dinner or for breakfast some morning with fried scrapple.

Wash, core and slice in 1/2 inch thick rings 4 large cooking apples. Saute in butter or margarine in a heavy frying pan until slightly brown. Mix together 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt and sprinkle one half of the mixture over the apples. Cook for three or four minutes and turn. Sprinkle with remaining sugar mixture. Continue cooking over low heat until apples are almost transparent. Serve hot. Serves 6.
