Coach Bob Dusenberry's scrapping Lions proved too much for the Corvallis Spartans when they walloped them 38-25 on their home court Saturday night.

Although the game wasn't a spectacular one, the Lions played good steady basketball throughout the entire game.

Corvallis started a lineup made up mostly of B squad players who had showed Albany a good time the night before, opening the scoring with a lay-in and a gifter. Heath of the Grovers immediately tied the score with a book shot and a gifter, but Corvallis forged

ahead to hold a slim 9 to 8 margin at the end of the quarter.

At this point in the game the Corvallis coach shoved in the rest of his regulars since it was evident that the Lions would not be beaten easily. In spite of this the Lions forged in the second by scoring four field goals and two free throws to the Spartans two field goals and one free throw. This put the Grovers in front 18-14 at halftime.

The game was resumed after the crowd was given a chance to view the Lions 1956 basketball squad, the midjet players from Jefferson grade school.

In the third quarter the Lions, led by their two speedy guards, Neideigh and Newton, broke the Spartans' man to man defense with two quick scoring plays and forced them to shift back to their zone defense. The Lions outscored the Spartans quintet 13-6 in this frame and held an eleven point margin starting the final quarter.

The last quarter was played on more even terms with the Lions holding never less than a ten-point lead. In the closing seconds of the game Wilbur Heath sunk a tip-in to give the Grove quintet a 38-25 lead at the end of the game.

Gordon Neideigh again held the scoring honors with 13 points but Wilbur Heath was hot on his tail with 12. Perin was high scorer for the visitors with 6 points.

The Lion B squad was defeated 39-16 by the Spartan B team in the first game of the evening. The B squad is improving fast and has a good chance to win some games before the season is over.

After the A squad game there was a game between the faculty and Lions club. This game was a funny combination of basketball, football and something else. No one knew, unless the players might know what it was. Hap Wolfard and Mr. Pyle displayed outstanding abilities. Hap, with

after receiving his discharge at Fort Lewis, Wash., January 26. He served in New Guinea, New Britain, the Philippines and Korea and is entitled to wear the Philippine liberation and American campaign ribbon with four bronze battle stars. He reports an exciting experience on his way home to the states on the SS Marine Falcon. The boat carried about 3,100 enlisted men and was returning home for repairs, having had a hole torn in the port side in a collision with another ship during a big storm at Okinawa. As they neared the states the ship encountered rough seas and at about 8:00 p. m. one night the lights went out and the engines died. Then came orders to abandon the ship, but before the order was carried out, the men were informed the trouble was caused from a short in the wiring, instead of something more serious.
