After hearing a letter from the Western Association of Lumbermen and Loggers the grange voted to oppose the proposed allotment of O. & C. timber. The letter said in part "This plan is entirely monopolistic, un-American and will not only work a great hardship on 85% of the lumber industry in western Oregon and northern California, but it will also in turn work a great hardship on returning veterans, farmers and the general public, not only in this area, but over the entire U. S. where lumber is so badly needed for uses." The legislative committee will meet with committees from other granges for further study and to form a resolution to send to state and national granges.
