TEN SCHOLARSHIPS TO U. OF O.

JUST ARRIVED

WHEAT STOCKS IN PACIFIC NORTHWEST

January 1, 1946, wheat stocks in the Pacific northwest states (Oregon, Washington and Idaho) amounted to about 76,064,000 bushels or 13 percent less than a year ago, the Crop Reporting Service reports. These stocks were in four positions: namely, (1) farm storage, (2) interior mills, elevators and warehouses, (3) terminal storage and (4) merchant mills. Stocks on farms in the northwest approximated 24,661,000 bushels, a decline of 9 percent compared with January 1, 1945, but holdings of interior were down 21 percent to 40,317,000 bushels. Terminal stocks, however, were somewhat larger than a year ago, but the holdings of merchant mills showed no great change.

Segregate Poultry
