The game started with Love-lace, the Axemen's lanky forward laying one in from the tip-off. Neideigh and Campbell came back with a free throw each for the Lions, leaving the Axemen with a 4-2 lead in the opening seconds. The Axemen laid in five field goals and one free throw to the Lions' four free throws and one field goal, leaving the first quarter score at 11-6 for the Eugene quintet.

In the beginning of the second quarter Campbell started a drive that brought the Lions up to within one point of the Axemen's lead. The Axemen again pulled away from the Lions by leaving the half-time score 25-17.

The third quarter started with the Lions making four field goals and a free throw before the Axemen had a chance to score. The Axemen, fearing the Lions who were clawing viciously at the lead, began a rampage that put the Lions behind again at the end of the fourth quarter 39-27. The Lions couldn't get back on their feet during the last frame, but made the Axemen work hard for their last points ending the game in a 54-32 victory over Coach Bob Dusenberry's hard-driving Lions.

Vetch Certification Deadline Feb. 20th

Growers of Willamette vetch are reminded that February 20th is the deadline for making application to certify fields for seed according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent. The prospective acreage in the state exceeds the record of 45,000 acres in 1945. In Lane county last year eighty five growers certified 3,135 acres in Lane county. More vetch acreage was planted over the county last fall but up to Saturday night Mr. Fletcher said only 60 growers had filed 2,434 acres for certification.

Most of the acreage will be inspected for eligibility for cover crop seed, though in most respects the requirements are the same as for regular certified seed. Chief difference is that for cover crop seed the field must have been in crops other than common vetch for at least one year instead of the three required for full certification.

General requirements are that blue tag seed must have been seeded with tags saved to accompany the application for certification. New fields that have been harrowed after drilling or which were broadcast are not eligible. Any grain such as oats sowed as a supporting crop must be free from common vetch.

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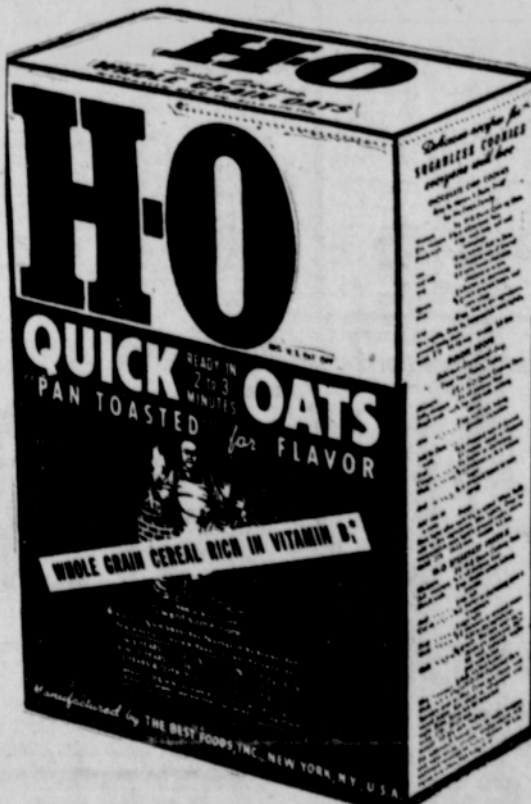
