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CRIME RECORD

In an address before the annual meeting of Catholic Youth, J. Edgar Hoover, director of the federal bureau of investigation, in discussing the importance of efforts dedicated to good citizenship and toward clean living, said:

"The postwar crime wave which we feared is upon us. It is amounting in intensity. It is growing in severity. It is not isolated. It is nationwide. In fact, other countries report similar experiences. Lawlessness is not inherited; it is acquired and so is character. Therefore, is it not much more important to build character?"

"View with me, if you will, the passing parade of crime. It presents a sordid spectacle. Out of each 1,000 marching in this endless parade, 521 have marched before to a prior arrest, and 210 are under 21 years of age. More persons aged 17 are arrested than in any other age group. Of each 1,000 murderers, 140 are under 21 years of age; of every 1,000 robbers, 360 are under 21; of burglars, 510; of thieves, 340; of arsonists, 250; of 1,000 car thieves, 630 are under 21; and of 1,000 rapists, 320 are under 21 years of age.

"In the background of each of these youths lies a story of shocking neglect. Boys and girls are being deprived of the care and guidance necessary to the proper formation of their characters. Their lawlessness had its roots in every instance in broken homes, in homes where mothers and fathers, because of their neglect, misunderstanding or irresponsibility, had failed in their primary obligation."

BIBLE TEACHINGS

Few people today have any conception of the important part the Bible teachings played in the business progress of the United States or the creation of our government. America was founded on man's consciousness of God, man's daily labor and the fruits therefrom.

All over the world, during the past two decades, political teachings which aggrandized an individual, have taken the place of Bible teachings. Equality, freedom and religious liberty have been lost in nations which glorified individuals rather than principles.

In our own country, strong factions are seeking to tie our future progress to all-powerful government. People are losing sight of the fact that America was not built on this basis, but was built upon a constitution that embodies the teachings of the Bible.

It is high time that we came to our senses and, instead of aping foreign governments that criticize our country but turn to it for men and money to settle their everlasting quarrels and poverty, renewed our respect for the spirit that breathes behind our own constitution, based on ideals which have given us liberty and blessings beyond those enjoyed by all other peoples.

And don't let any foreign or domestic politician try to tell you he has a system under which government will do for the individual what the individual cannot do for himself if he keeps government his servant rather than his master.

DON'T WASTE FOOD

It has been estimated that 20 percent of all the food produced in this country goes into the garbage pail, or is otherwise wasted.

During normal times when the world is fairly well fed this waste is bad enough, but in these days when peoples of many countries are suffering acutely from hunger it is deplorable.

The very ease with which we can get food tends to make us less understanding of the food situation in other countries. America has a remarkably fine food production system which is now turning out record crops. The Nation also has outstanding food distribution facilities composed chiefly of the thousands of independent grocers serving virtually every community from Maine to California. The efficiency of our food producers and especially of our independent grocers makes a wide variety of food available to the American housewife at very reasonable prices.

But, in order to make the most of this advantage and to avoid wasting our abundance, greater care and economy in the kitchen should be exercised. We can all be well fed and still provide more food for the underfed in other lands if we prevent food spoilage in our homes and correct the bad habit of leaving food on our plates.

When we realize that the amount of food wasted in America is enough to feed the combined populations of Norway, Belgium, Greece and Czechoslovakia we can better grasp the magnitude of waste.

Washington Letter

As this is written, Mr. Ickes' resignation as Secretary of the Interior has just been courtly accepted by the President. Ickes resigned effective March 31. The President ordered him to vacate his office February 15th—just two days notice.

Meanwhile, rumors of other high-level changes are rampant. Gossip has it that Paul Porter, FCC chairman and an important political advisor to the administration, is moved to OPA he is really being kicked upstairs on his way out. Since last summer, there has been ill feeling between Porter and Bob Hannegan. Hannegan rates higher in administration party circles so it is considered he is going to do some maneuvering to get rid of Porter.

The bill known as the Case bill which was passed by the House last week by an overwhelming vote will never become a law in its present form. Every member of the House knew that at the time the roll on the bill was called. The bill supposedly is contrary to the best interests of organized labor. It certainly is contrary to the wishes of the labor leaders. Their idea of legislation is to have no legislation at all. Having been sent to the Senate, it is generally conceded that one of two things will happen to the Case bill. Either it will be pigeonholed by the Senate Committee on Labor, and nothing more will be heard of it during the remainder of this Congress—or it will be completely revamped, changed beyond recognition.

The House Banking and Currency Committee is conducting hearings on the bill to extend Price Control which law expires at the end of June. This is the OPA law. Recently, the OPA people have been playing with smart propaganda designed to sell the housewives on the fine job being done. The "off-again-on-again" operation of citrus fruit price ceiling orders around the holiday season was a propaganda gesture. It was supposed to show what would happen if ceiling prices were removed. The plan backfired. As we have shown by studies made by the Republican Food Study Committee, the citrus fruit price debacle did nothing more than disrupt the citrus industry and bring about slightly higher prices. Our study revealed, and it was so reported, that in order to cover what actually happened, the OPA deliberately resorted to releasing false and inaccurate figures.

As the time for action on the OPA law nears, many very level headed members of congress are fearful that dissatisfaction of the people—which will be reflected in the attitude of their representatives in congress—that this disapproval could possibly result in the failure of congress to renew the OPA act. These members realize that there is still a need for price control over a great many articles and classes of goods. But the hopelessly bad administration of the law has made people so disgusted that regardless of the dangers of removing price controls, things couldn't be much worse.

Most of the dissatisfaction with OPA stems from the fact that the present 'erap of OPA regulations are slowing up, even strangling production. Woolen mills cannot make 100% virgin wool suiting and will not ruin their reputations in the trade by making shoddy cloth. Manufacture of radio sets is held up because OPA has not set prices on certain small parts. Regulations on milk and cream virtually stopped the manufacture of butter. The regulations were supposed to hold down prices. The result was that housewives bought whipping cream and churned their own butter at more than a 50 per cent increase in cost of the butter. Space permitting, I could list dozens of similar instances of maladministration. Greater production is the greatest safe-guard against inflation but OPA, charged with the responsibility of holding back inflation, is ignoring the necessity for production as a basic means of checking inflation.

Appropriation bills are now being taken up on the Floor, of the

House. Administration forces consistently fight for increased spending. The Republicans in the House are doggedly fighting for reductions.
