Mrs. T. Cathcart Dies Suddenly 17

Rites for Mrs. Theodosia L. Cathcart, 78, who died suddenly Sunday afternoon at 1:00 p. m. were held from the Mills mortuary Tuesday afternoon with the Rev. J. Michael Shelley, Christian minister, officiating. Interment was in the Masonic-I.O.O.F. cemetery.

Death occurred Sunday at her residence at 1653 West Main. She was born August 9, 1868 at Cottage Grove and was married to Frank Cathcart here September 25, 1888. Mr. Cathcart died in 1940.

Mrs. Cathcart was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Adams, pioneer residents. The old family home, among the first to be built here, still stands on South River road. She had resided here for the past five years, coming from Scappoose. She was a member of the Christian church.

Surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Mary Hambric, Mrs. Hattie McFarland and Mrs. Lydia VanBuren, all of Cottage Grove.
