Poultry Meat Is Now the Best Buy

Those who denied themselves all the chicken and turkey they wanted during the war because of scarcity and high prices can now indulge themselves fully at reasonable prices, reminds Noel L. Bennion, extension poultryman at O. S. C.

Bennion points to the fact that the amount of poultry including turkeys now in cold storage is at an all-time high. Furthermore the supply is getting larger as growers market more chickens and some turkey breeding hens because of the acute shortage of feed.

With all classes of poultry now selling below ceiling prices, this meat is probably the best buy. Bennion believes. Liberal use of it now will help consumers as well as the Oregon poultry industry, he says.

SPRING WHEAT INSURANCE DEADLINE SET AT MAR. 16

Crop insurance agents and AAA offices in Oregon spring wheat counties now are accepting applications for 1946 crop insurance. E. H. Miller, chairman of the state AAA committee, has announced.

Urging growers to sign their applications as soon as possible, Miller points out that spring wheat insurance must be applied for before the crop is seeded, and not later than March 16.

The 1946 winter wheat crops on 2700 Oregon farms in 19 counties are protected by federal crop insurance against all risks except those due to negligence. At least 50 farms in a county must apply for insurance before the program becomes effective in that county.
