Crops Planted in Spring Variable As to Prospects

Variable outlooks for Oregon's spring-planted annual and perennial crops are indicated in a review of related production, demand and price information just published by the O.S.C. extension service. Approximately one-half of the total acreage used for crop production in Oregon is used for such crops.

Principal spring-planted crops are corn, most of the barley and oats, some wheat, rye and hay; forage, crop seeds, potatoes and most of the truck crops, sugar beets, flax, dry beans, tree fruits and nuts, small fruits and various specialty horticultural crops.

The demand outlook for both food grains and feed grains is strong for the balance of the 1945-46 marketing season and stocks are expected to be reduced to the lowest point for several years by the middle of 1946.

Wheat exports are very large, offset partly by reductions in its use for feed and industrial purposes. The report indicates that in the longer outlook it is significant that the United States production of food grains (wheat, rye, rice and buckwheat) in 1945, per capita, was 45 percent above the 1935-1939 average. Another billion-bushel wheat crop may be harvested this year and if Canada, Argentina, Australia and other countries have good crops United States exports during 1946-47 may be small compared with 1945-46.

The report contains several charts and tables of data showing trends in production, prices and costs. The national production of potatoes and truck crops in 1945 was on a rather high level to be maintained in 1946. Growers are being asked to curtail the potato acreage—16 percent in Oregon.

The acreage of potatoes in Oregon in 1945 was 45 percent above the 1935-1939 average. The acreage of green peas for processing was 160 percent above prewar, snap beans 148 percent higher and sweet corn for processing up 94 percent. Growers of vegetable crops need to have market outlets arranged before planting.

The complete report is available free from county agents.
