Food Surplus in Northwest Mostly Wheat, Peas, Spud

Oregon's food surplus available for overseas shipment to war-torn nations consists mostly of wheat, dry peas and perhaps some potatoes and dried prunes, according to an analysis of data on food production and population by the extension agricultural economics section at O.S.C. These are national surplus items produced in the Pacific northwest in greater quantity than needed in Pacific coast markets.

The need for wheat and late potatoes in California however, exceeds production in that state which is also short on eggs, dairy products and meat. California now has about 7 percent of the United States population, while 1945 wheat output there was only about 1 percent of the national total. California egg production was only 3.8 percent, cattle and calves 3, sheep 5.4 and hogs 1.3 percent.

The Pacific northwest population is now about 3 percent of the national total. Thus the four Pacific states have 10 percent of the population of the nation. This is a population gain in the four states of 27 percent over the 1935-1939 average, compared with 9 percent increase in the whole United States.

Milk production in the four Pacific states, including Idaho, in 1945 is estimated at 8.8 percent of the national output, with cattle and calves at 6.8 percent, sheep and lambs 11.6, hogs 2.6, eggs 6.8, turkeys 21.7, wheat 11.1, potatoes 24.7, truck crops for processing 24.6, truck crops for fresh market 32.5, all fruits combined 55.7, tree nuts 59.2, dry beans 39.2 and dry peas 86.5 percent.

Copies of the complete statistical memorandum have been supplied to county agricultural agents for background information in the present food situation. The data are also expected to be of value in connection with long-time production and marketing problems.

Current farm market reviews are broadcast by the O.S.C. extension service over radio station KOAC at 7:15 p.m. Twelve such reviews are prepared each week from USDA market reports and other data, in addition to the spot market news broadcast at 12:30 p.m. and 7:15 p.m.

The reviews on Monday cover general farm price-cost-crop-weather information and Oregon specialty crops, seeds, etc.; Tuesday, potatoes, truck and tree crops and hay; Wednesday, eggs and poultry and commercial feed stuffs; Thursday, meat animals, wool and hops; Friday, dairy products and grains. Saturday (12:30 p.m.) Boston wool review and North Portland livestock market review.

Simpson Urges Clamp on Lumber For Hell Joints

March 5, 1946 (Special)—New regulations for the Civilian Administration for the diversion of scarce building materials from "worse than useless kinds of construction, such as roadhouses and saloons, into the housing of our veterans need and deserve," were forecast today by H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association. He gave assurance that the West Coast lumber industry would support such regulations all the way through, and urged that all building groups join in putting housing for veterans first on the list of jobs to be done.

"All over the United States there is what amounts to a riot of new construction on race tracks, dance halls, road houses, night clubs, saloon hells, gambling joints, poolrooms and other underworld 'spots' that compete for the 'sucker money' that is in circulation literally by the billions," Simpson asserted. "The characters who are going for that 'easy dough' don't care how they get their places of so-called business built so long as they get them. No other kind of construction in the Pacific Northwest or elsewhere has taken so much materials and labor out of the channels of the legitimate home building industry, which is striving to provide decent

housing for veterans at reasonable costs.

Property Owners Urged to Repair Sidewalks for Use

At the recent meeting of the City Council, enforcement of sidewalk and dog ordinances was discussed.

Now that materials are again available for repair and construction of sidewalks, there seems to be no reason for excusing negligence. Property owners are responsible for all sidewalks abutting their property and shall be expected to maintain them. They must also be kept clear of vines and shrubs to insure full use of the walk.

City officials and mail carriers have not been firm in their demands during the period when man-power and material were scarce, but there seems to be no need for further leniency.

Attention was also called to one of the newer ordinances, number 1239, which requires limbs hanging over sidewalks and streets to be cut at least eight feet above the sidewalks or street.

The fact that a dog owner procures a license for his pet does not entitle the animal to run at large. Many citizens have already begun to prepare for an early garden. It is hoped that dog owners will eliminate possibility of complaints to the police headquarters by strict compliance with city ordinances.

City dads issue this little warning in the hope that it will be sufficient and enforcement measures will be unnecessary.
