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LET'S FINISH OUR TASK

Friday night a young couple lost their possessions and a new home by fire. This tragedy on top of others that have occurred in this and surrounding communities is the best argument we know in favor of fire protection for the rural section of south Lane county and yet because of lack of time we are about to let the proposed rural fire protective association die a natural death.

The last time we checked with the sponsors of the association there were not sufficient signers to the petitions to call an election. At the time the petitions were started sponsors hoped to have the petitions signed and into the county court in time to have the measure appear on the ballot this fall. But this has been some six weeks ago.

The matter of circulating the petitions takes both effort and time and if the association falls by the wayside, the fault will lie chiefly in the fact that we did not take the necessary time to get the signatures required.

So far as we know the proposition has one hundred percent support from those who have made a study of it. Our immediate task is to get out and get the signatures to the petitions.

The question for those living outside of the city limit to decide is whether they want fire protection—Municipal fire departments in most places now won't go outside of the city limits to fight fires and Cottage Grove will be no exception to this rule, if the rural fire protective association fails.

Let's finish the job—We can't afford to get the name of being a good starter but a poor finisher.

INFLATION NOT NUMBER ONE PROBLEM

Controlling inflation is not the nation's number one problem. The number one problem is how to preserve representative government in the face of inflation. It may be impossible to control inflation due to natural forces over which the people have no control. It is possible to preserve representative government because that is a political question and political questions are clearly within the power of the people to decide.

The argument is often heard that unless inflation is controlled, the resulting chaos will automatically destroy freedom, and history is called upon to support such an argument. But in answer to this it can be said that there has never been another nation in history like the United States. Her people are highly literate, closely integrated by modern communication and transportation, and well informed on the problems of the day. They have been taught almost from the cradle that their heritage of independence is their most valued possession. Nothing can take this heritage away from them. If it is lost, they alone must lose it. If they permit it to be lost in the turmoil of transitory economic upsets, they deserve to lose it. But they should realize now that the suffering of inflation will be as nothing compared to the suffering of political tyranny once it has a secure hold upon our lives.

No, inflation is not the nation's number one problem.

Science Uses**Snake Venom**

Snake venom, blood-chilling aspect of nature, has been harnessed by science.

Thanks to scientific research, the venom of cobras and other deadly reptiles is now used in the treatment of such diseases as angina pectoris, leprosy, palsy and cancer, according to an article in the May issue of Science Illustrated, a new science magazine.

"When a cobra bites a man, its venom paralyzes him, causing death by asphyxiation when the paralysis reaches his respiratory centers," the article states in part. "But when a doctor injects cobra venom into the human system (being careful not to use too much), the neurotoxin acts as a pain-killer. Because it is not habit-forming, as are many modern drugs used for this purpose, cobra venom has been found useful for controlling pain in various diseases."

Incidentally, if you should be so unfortunate as to be bitten by a snake, and nothing happens in the next ten minutes, you can be sure it wasn't a poisonous snake. To be on the safe side, however, it is advisable to take every precaution even before ascertaining whether or not the snake is poisonous.
