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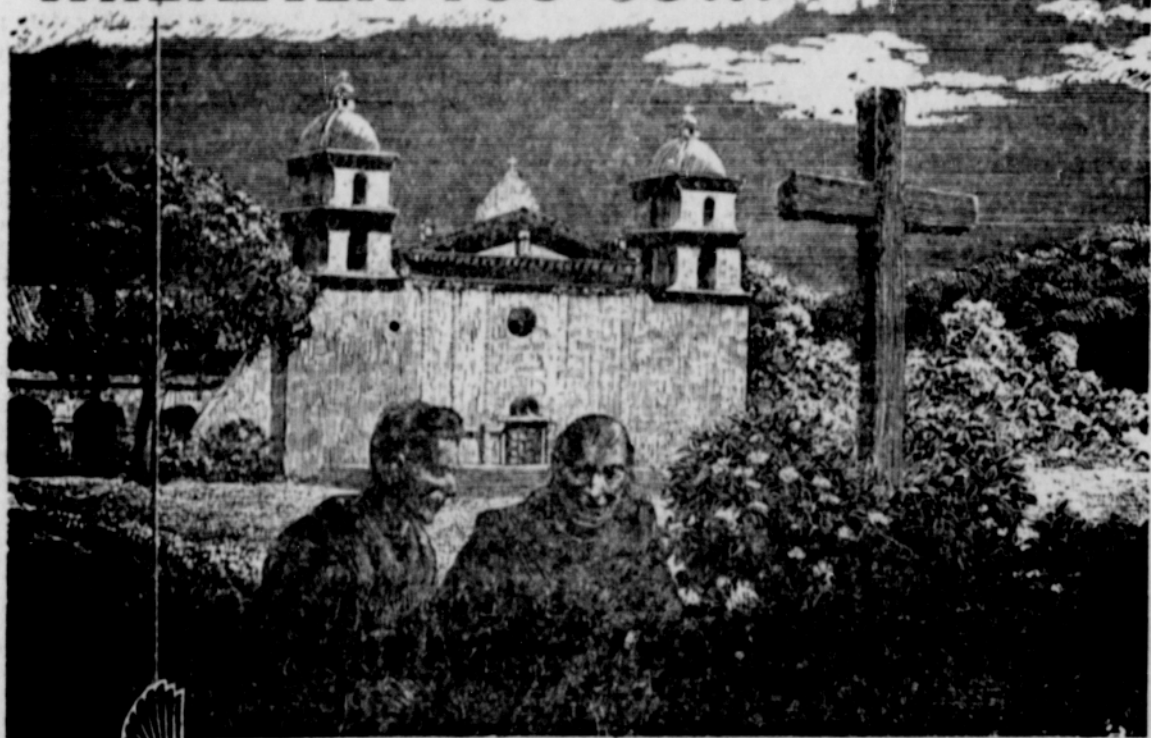

Longest Footpath

The longest marked footpath in the world is the Appalachian trail which runs from Mount Katahdin in Maine to Mount Oglethorpe in Georgia, a distance of 2,050 miles. Constructed between 1921 and 1940, it traverses parts of 12 states, 2 national parks, 6 national forests and some 20 state parks and forests.
