REBEKAH MEET

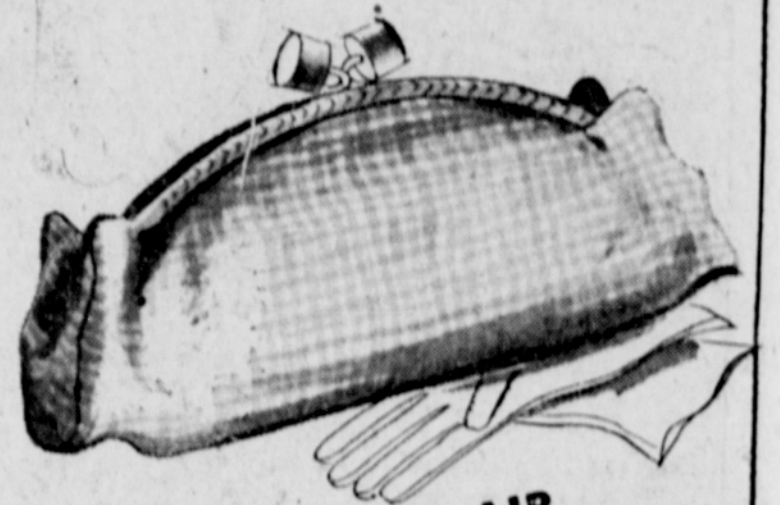
