THE SUBSIDIZED PRESS

Quite often during a political campaign, the charges that certain newspapers are subsidized are heard, depending on whether or not the particular newspaper is "for or against" the politician and his cohorts.

Robert W. Ruhle, editor of the Medford Mail Tribune, recently covered the charges of newspaper subsidization very effectively and we quote from his column:

Newspapers are always being criticized and always will be. The reason—or at least one reason—is the nature of the newspaper business.

Then, of course, there are those people—quite a number of them—who don't like to have their names in the newspapers unless the occasion is to them highly favorable.

Finally there are those—not many—who honestly don't like publicity whether it is favorable or unfavorable, but when they get in the news they have to "take" it, so they join the ranks of the malcontents.

Newspapers realize all this and therefore as a class newspaper men are pretty well conditioned to criticism.

All of which has been aroused by an indictment of newspapers by Alexander Meiklejohn, the eminent educator, who wants them taken over by the universities of the country, and liquidated from the area of private and profitable enterprise.

On the one hand they (the publishers) are in bondage to their advertisers, whose interests they must serve.

In other words the newspaper business in this country has become a mercenary and enslaved profession, controlled in one direction by the advertisers, in another by the readers, so the only hope for a free independent press is to turn the whole shebang over to the colleges and universities!

Of course there are all sorts of newspapers, good, bad and indifferent, but we would like to have Mr. Meiklejohn take a job on any daily American paper that could be called typical—representative in any real sense of the profession as a whole—and see what he calls "bondage" from day to day, at close range.

There isn't a newspaper worthy of the name that doesn't resist advertising or reader pressure of some kind—or both—at least once a week.

As above remarked, it is all in the newspaper day's work—to a greater or lesser extent it goes on all the time.

And yet here is a high educational authority maintaining seriously it is the tool of those who support it by their subscriptions or advertising. NONSENSE!
