Green Lawn

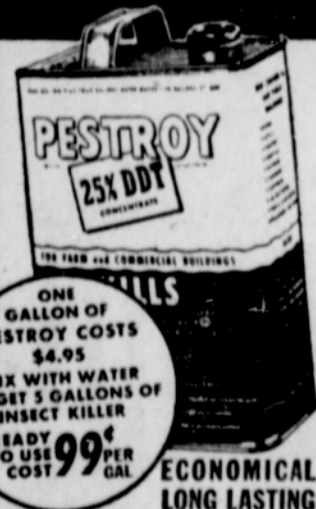
