

Bohemia District To Get New Roads In Forest Program

Study of timber utilization road needs on the Umpqua National Forest for the next 25 years, resulted in plans for construction of 613 miles of new road and improvements to 445 miles of existing road at a cost of \$8,076,500.00. It was announced Friday at Roseburg by M. M. Nelson, forest supervisor, according to the Roseburg News-Review.

It would be largely a self-liquidating project, Nelson said, as roads constructed by the Forest Service or the Public Roads Administration are paid for by higher prices received for stumpage.

Some roads will not be constructed by the government. When private operators are called upon to construct their own roads in connection with timber sales, the Forest Service cannot ask as high a price for stumpage as when this expense is borne by the government.

It is estimated that 8,555,000 feet of timber, at a cost of 94 cents per thousand board feet, will be made available by the road construction program.

By districts, the 25-year program will cost \$2,800,000 for the North Umpqua; \$3,400,000 for the South Umpqua; \$1,500,000 for the Bohemia, and \$200,000 for the Diamond Lake.

This study of a 25-year road construction program is the only such study yet made of national forests in the Northwest region, Nelson said. It was made by H. F. Erickson, Forest Service engineer, in the regional office at Portland.

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\$277,000 Timber Sale at Myrtle Creek Announced

A sale of forty-nine million board feet of high grade National Forest timber to the South Umpqua Timber Company of Myrtle Creek was announced Monday by M. M. Nelson, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest. The timber sold is located on the Divide between the North and South Umpqua rivers, and will be removed over the present South Myrtle Creek road to the town of Myrtle Creek for manufacturing. The South Umpqua Timber Company, which was the successful bidder in competition for the sale, operates the Fir Manufacturing Company, a large sawmill, and is at the present time starting construction of a Fir Pine Plywood Plant at Myrtle Creek.

The selling value was \$277,000 of which 25% will go to the counties in lieu of taxes, and an additional 10% will be used for road construction within the county.

"The total value of the log" when delivered to the mill pond is estimated to be \$1,200,000, Nelson said. "Most of this amount will be in payroll dollars spent in Douglas County."

The South Umpqua Timber Co. expects to start road construction immediately in order to open up this tract of timber for logging during the coming summer.

This sale is only one of many National Forest sales being made by the forest service to aid in the present housing emergency.

All bids submitted on the Dorena dam housing project opened by the U. S. Engineers June 3rd were rejected. It was learned here Tuesday. Contractors were asked to bid on moving 30 housing units from a housing area near Vancouver, Washington to the dam area, approximately eight miles east of here. Five contractors submitted bids for moving twenty-six two-bedroom units and four one-bedroom duplexes. The five bids ranged in price from \$83,224.00 to \$55,576.00. The contracting officer's estimate was \$25,412.00. P. J. Bush and sons of Cottage Grove were among the bidders.

Veterans May Now Enlist in Reserve US Army Corps

A recent army regulation grants enlistments in the enlisted reserve corps according to Capt. Spence of the Eugene office of the United States army recruiting service. "Many veterans recently discharged are not aware of the fact that they can sign up in the enlisted reserve corps to guard their discharge grade in the event that they are ordered to active duty," says Capt. Spence of the local recruiting office.

In order to be eligible for the enlisted reserve corps, a male individual must have served in the army, navy, marine corp, or coast guard for a period of at least six months, been discharged under honorable conditions, must meet physical standards, must not be a selective service registrant classified 1A, and he must maintain a permanent residence within the continental limits of the United States or its possessions.

Dorena Dam Work Expected to Start At an Early Date

Work of relocating the utilities around the proposed Dorena dam, east of town is expected to start soon. Only one bid for the relocation of the O. P. & E. railway, market road No. 30 and the Cottage Grove city water main was received by the U. S. district engineer's office in Portland. The bid was made by Leonard and Slate and E. C. Hall, all of Portland. The local engineer's office this morning had not been officially notified that the contract had been signed. However the contractor is moving equipment to the site of the work. According to the terms of the contract, construction must start within five days from the time the contract is signed.

Council Hears Routine Matters Monday Evening

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening, the ordinance relative to the reassignment of the Cottage Grove Gas Co., was read and approved. At the request of O. M. Patten, the city attorney was requested to prepare a five year franchise in the matter of a garbage disposal contract.

The city council asked for bids on a tractor to be used in street work. The council also heard a petition from the W. A. Woodard Lumber Co. asking for a portion of streets lying between the highway and the Southern Pacific railroad to be vacated including 8th street and Adams avenue. This will provide a site for construction of a building supply house, which it is understood will be erected by the Woodard Lumber Co.

A motion was also made and seconded that an ordinance regarding the adoption of the 1946 building code be prepared and submitted.

LOGGERS WARNED OF EQUIPMENT SHORTAGE

WASHINGTON — The Civilian Production Administration Saturday announced an Oregon-Washington lumber production of 698,286,000 board feet in March. The total was 17 per cent above February but 15 per cent under March 1945.

The agency warned that a logging equipment shortage, intensified by strikes, lies ahead.
