Two C. G. Students Graduate from OSC

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, June 3rd — Douglass Sherman Johnson, senior in science, and Miriam Ella Ferrin, senior in home economics, will represent Cottage Grove among 420 members of the class of 1946 who will receive their degrees at the seventy-seventh annual commencement at Oregon State college Sunday, June 9.

Both the baccalaureate service and the graduation exercises will be the same day, the former beginning at 11 o'clock and the latter at 8. Both will be broadcast over the station KOAC.

Women outnumber men 244 to 176 in this first postwar graduating class, which accounts for the fact that the home economics school has the largest number of graduates with 100. Other schools and degree granting divisions have the following number of graduates receiving bachelor degrees: business and industry, 60; science, 53; engineering, 48; education, 41; agriculture, 41; forestry, 22; nursing education, 16; pharmacy, 7.

The first doctor of philosophy degree in home economics to be granted here will go to Mrs. Suen-i Wu Chang, who will return to China to help organize extension work in homemaking. Other graduate degrees include 19 masters of science, five masters of education, one each master of arts and master of forestry, and three professional degrees in engineering.

One honorary degree of Doctor of Laws will be conferred on E. C. Sammons, Portland, former member of the state board of higher education and head of government bond campaigns throughout the war. He will also deliver a tribute on the commencement program to Oregon State who served in World War II.
