**Clyde Beatty, Famous Trainer, Heads His Own Circus Coming to Eugene**



EXEMPLIFYING man's dominance over the most savage, cruel, blood-thirsty, man-killing beasts ever assembled, Clyde Beatty appears twice daily with his jungle performers at the Clyde Beatty Railroad circus, at Eugene this Saturday and Sunday.

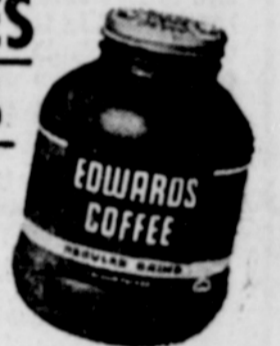
