Patience, principle and persistence are three essentials necessary at the foreign ministers' council at Paris.

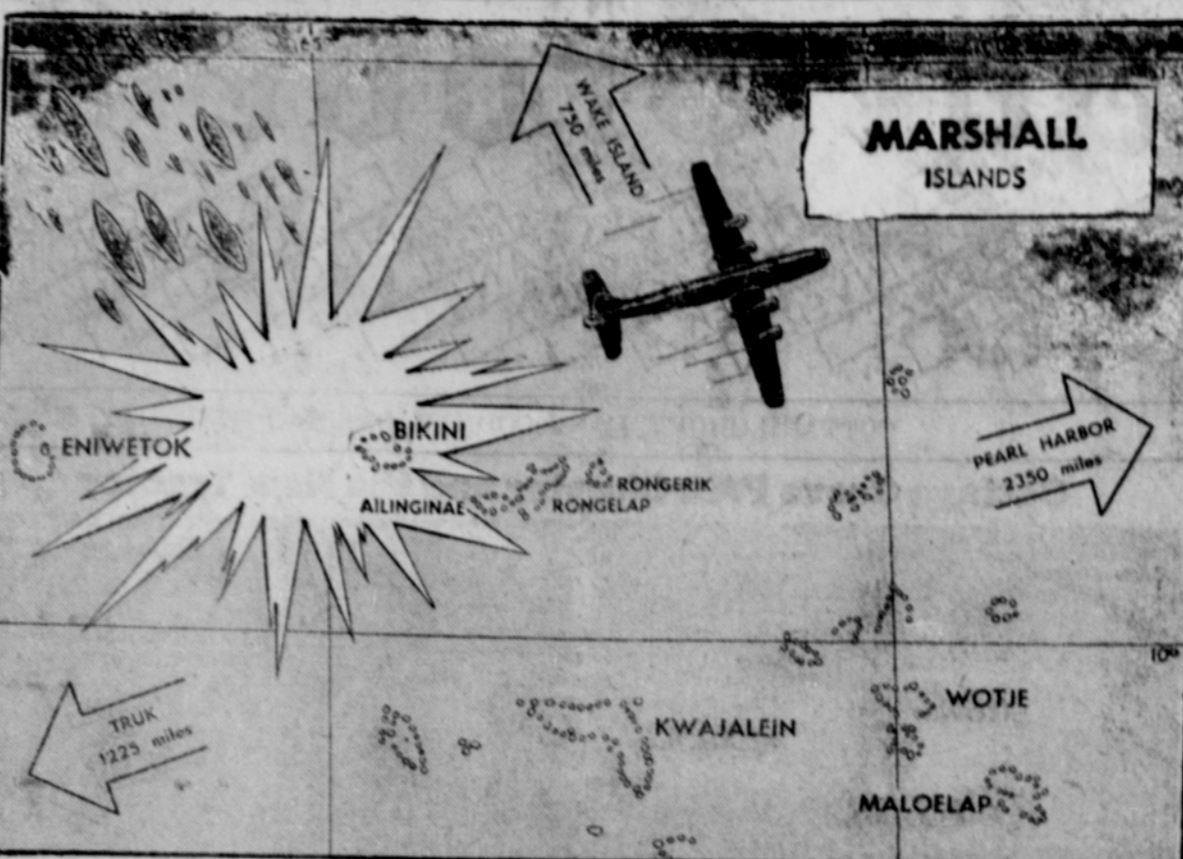
We should listen to the news on the radio more carefully. Sometimes we hear some commentator's opinion on the air and then state what the commentator said as a fact.
