Walker Community Church Gets Face Lifting Recently

The community church at Walker, located on a hill a few hundred yards west of highway 99 has recently undergone a complete face lifting and has been redecorated in the interior from the floor to the ceiling, refurbished and re-finished drapes, giving it a very attractive appearance. The improvement was made possible by generous donations from the public from Cottage Grove to Eugene, feeling that the building erected in 1895 should be preserved.

Old records show that the plans for the building were submitted by George Lee of Cottage Grove. That Rev. C. H. Wallace, an old circuit rider was responsible for the first meeting called February 5, 1895. A faithful worker during the construction period was a stone mason, who laid the foundation.

J. L. Walker, for whom Walker station was named, Francis Smith who established the Walker post office and Geo. T. Sears, a farmer in the community were largely responsible for the successful erection of the building. The acreage where the building stands is part of the old Hamilton donation land claim and was secured from Chas. Wright, another pioneer of that community. Lumber used in the building came from a small mill out toward London and out Lane way. Two days were necessary to haul the lumber by wagon from the mill to the church.

The first soliciting committee showed as much ability as John Schofield Stewart, the village plumber due to the fact that they gathered in pounds of beef, potatoes at 25 cents per sack etc., which paid the carpenters earning \$1.50 per day while the head carpenter drew \$2.00 per day.

The hill on which the church edifice stands, is a beauty spot covered with Oregon's most beautiful woods. When the Scotch broom holds forth one can readily see the little building resting in a bank of gold, while the quiet little cemetery adjacent to the building, where the faithful souls responsible for its existence sleep peacefully.

The latest church equipment is the organ belong to Mrs. J. A. Joll, donated by her husband and son, Frank Joll. It will play the strains of the wedding march of the first modern wedding there June 23rd.

It is planned to preserve "The Little Church on the Hill" and convert it into a shrine and marriage place.

Marines Need 190 Men Immediately

190 men in the Marine Corps Reserve are needed immediately in the Marine Air Reserve Training program which was activated recently at the Naval Air Station, Seattle, it was announced by the Thirteenth Naval District. Commanding Officer of the Marine Air Detachment here is Lieutenant Colonel Desmond E. Canavan, US MC, a native of Seattle and former classmate of the famed Marine Corps flyers Gregory Boyington and Bob Galer.

Colonel Canavan emphasizes that members of the organized reserve will fly modern, well maintained aircraft and get paid for it. Drill pay for 48 drills per year will be received, and flight pay in addition, if in a flight pay status. Pay and allowances with travel pay will also be received during a two-weeks period of active duty each year. The program will make every effort to qualify members for Civil Aeronautics ratings.

Officers and enlisted men are entitled to fly at the Air Station, to receive two weeks active duty training with pay each year, and to attend various service schools on an active duty status.

Any male citizen over seventeen years of age who can meet the physical requirements may join

Army to Take Vets To June Thirtieth

Lt. Col. William M. Cohoon, commanding officer of the Oregon district army recruiting service, today announced that all army recruiting stations will remain open until midnight on June 30 for the purpose of permitting all ex-servicemen who desire to re-enlist in their discharge grade and have not exceeded the three months deadline to re-enlist in the highest grade either permanent or temporary held at the time of their discharge.

Those men who have been released for a period greater than ninety days will have an opportunity to re-enlist in a grade commensurate with their training and experience provided they do so before mid-night 30 June 1946.

After June 30, 1946 any person who enlists will not be guaranteed the family allowances during the entire period of their enlistment.

Col. Cohoon urges all men who are contemplating re-joining to make their arrangements with the nearest army recruiting station immediately to effect their contract before the deadline of 30 June and assure themselves of the highest grade and all the benefits to which they would be entitled by joining before midnight of June 30, 1946. The U. S. army recruiting office for Lane and Douglas counties is located in the post office building, Eugene, Oregon.
