TRADITIONS always have a reason-to-be, and in so far as "white for the bride" is concerned, the secret might well be that the bride who feels she looks beautiful actually does. That's the magic, for every bride, of white, as New York's famed designers of wedding dresses are well aware . . . and a possible explanation, too, for the increasing popularity of the all-white wedding.

Nonetheless, today's bride isn't necessarily a vision in white satin.

She has her choice of a variety of equally lovely fabrics, including lace, net, nylonette, mousseline and organza in the heirloom type of bridal gown. The simple but enchanting dress pictured, perfect for either a Summer garden or church

ceremony, is made of still another picturesque material, dotted marquisette, and is shown with a matching bridesmaid's dress also in white.

The June bride can, if she likes, be a very sophisticated looking dream in a slim wedding dress of white rayon jersey, or she can be a modern Southern Belle and walk up the aisle in a hoopskirt. She can have short, puffed sleeves or leg-of-mutton sleeves or long, slim sleeves pointed over the wrist. Her train, like her veil, can be short or long.

A note of color for the bride's attendants for an all-white wedding is usually introduced in sashes, bouquets and headdresses.
