GERMAN WOOD RESEARCH LESS THAN THAT OF U. S.

The report of American forest products experts who have completed a study of Germany's research, technological and industrial developments with forest products during the war, indicates that, with few exceptions, Germany was considerably behind the United States in such developments. Following are the most significant findings of the experts.

(1) Improved technology for the rapid continuous fermentation of alcohol or protein yeast for food from wood sugar in sulfite pulp liquor and also from wood sugar factories.

(2) The development of a neutral resin adhesive (Polystal) reputed of high toughness that sets at a comparatively low temperature.

(3) The development of techniques for the production of bleached beech sulfite pulp of high alpha cellulose content and its use for cellulose nitrate.

(4) The application of prehydrolysis to pine pulp chips followed by kraft pulping and the production of a pulp used 100 per cent for cigarette paper.

(5) The use of nitric acid for producing purified pulps of high alpha content (this of practical interest in the United States only if cheap nitric acid should become available).

(6) The experimental and reported successful use of resin impregnated wood retainers for very high speed ball and roller bearings.

Elephant Raising

Leave a space of two-thirds of an inch apart between yeast buns, baking powder or soda biscuits, and cinnamon rolls when placing them in pans. This gives them room for expansion during raising and baking.

Ripening Cantaloupes

Cantaloupes will not tolerate frost and develop best at high temperatures. Low relative humidity of the air has been reported to favor thick setting and solid flesh. Plenty of sunshine is required for good flavor and high sugar content. For any variety, late ripening is associated with low temperatures and early ripening with high temperatures. Records show that a daily accumulation of 2530 degrees above 50 degrees Fahrenheit is necessary for ripening. This usually occurs in the spring from May 29 to June 12.

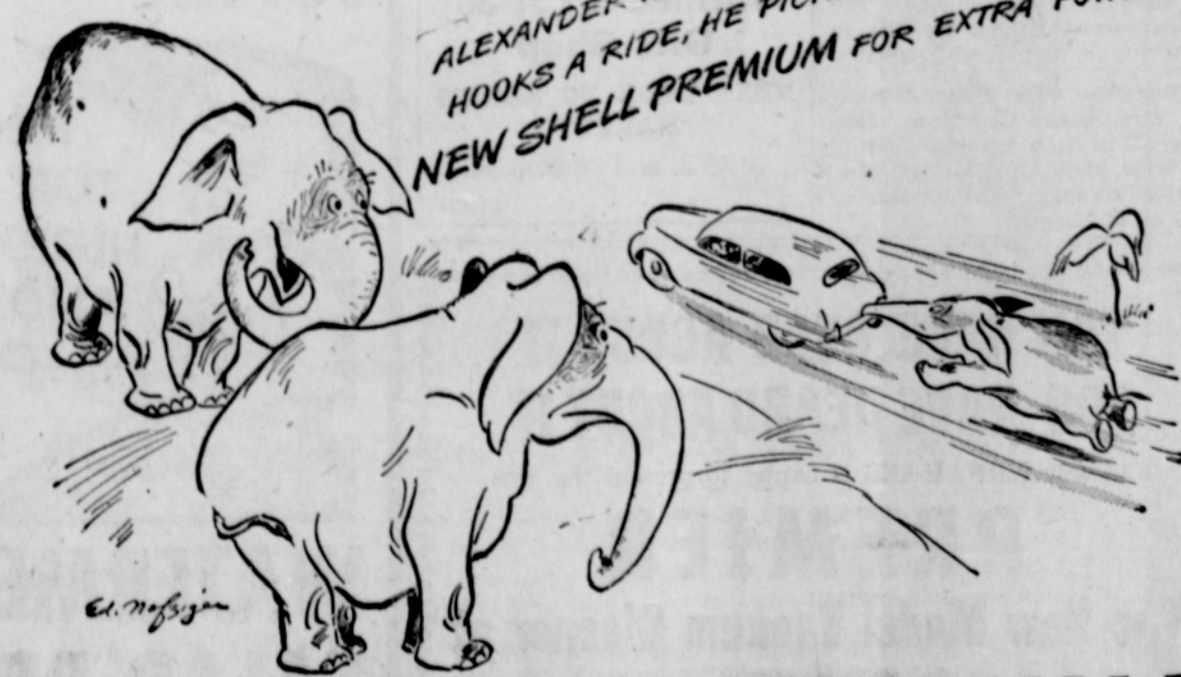
Turpentine Piped Under Channel
Pipe lines that were built during the war to carry gasoline under the English channel from England to Holland and France now deliver turpentine to the Netherlands where it is mixed with other basic ingredients of paint and varnish.

Stars and Stripes
On most railroads the star represents 25 years of service, and each bar or stripe represents five years of service. Thus, three bars indicate the wearer has been in the railroad's service for 15 or more years, four bars indicate 20 or more years of service; a star and two bars indicate 35 or more years of service and so on.

His sister, Mrs. Vera Suiter, also had had infantile paralysis, while her husband was in the army. His father, Mr. Harry Payne, now of Blue River, spent the night in Curtin with his son, Clayton, who took him to Eugene to try to get air transportation to Texas, where

Dean is to be buried with a military funeral, near the home of his wife, Mrs. Sam Gilman, who was a second mother to Dean, in visiting at Garibaldi. He also leaves two brothers, Lester and Earl of Blue River, in addition to Clayton of Curtin, and Vera Suiter of Lorane, and a sister, Mrs. Williams, of Eugene. He was so young to die.

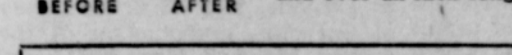
