Weddings Highlight Social Events For Traditional Month of Brides

"The Little Church" Vows Exchanged Scene of Wedding In Floral Setting

"The Little Historic Church on the Hill" at Walker was the scene Sunday afternoon June 23, at 2:00 o'clock for a beautiful wedding, the first modern wedding to be held in the little church. The bride, Miss Carolyn Johns, daughter of Mrs. Arlene Johns, and the groom, Wilbur Workman Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Workman, both of this city, were united in marriage by the Rev. Frank E. Brown, pastor of the local Methodist church, at a double ring service, before 175 relatives and friends. A white lattice fence intertwined with ferns and huckleberry greenery formed the background with candelabra and white tapers at either end and baskets of calla lilies on the piano and altar and calla lilies, mock orange blossoms and white carnations completing the church decorations. Each window contained a bouquet of greenery with white satin bows and streamers.

The candles were lighted by the bride's sister, Miss Gerandine Johns, and the groom's sister, Miss Jeanette Workman, preceding the ceremony. This was followed by Mrs. George Hardy singing "I Love Thee" and "The Lord's Prayer," accompanied by Miss Irene Schaffer. Miss Schaffer also played the wedding march from Lohengrin.
