Freight Rates to Be Hiked July 1

Increases in freight rates will be effective July 1st and will bring rail and water carriers an increased estimated revenue of \$390,000,000 yearly. A full hearing will be held shortly on the carriers petition to raise the rates 25 per cent. A general increase of six per cent will be made except on certain basic commodities. An additional five per cent for eastern railroads to equalize their earnings with other carriers. A three per cent boost on agriculture products and specific increases for coal and iron ore etc.

WEST COAST LUMBERMEN RENT PORTLAND OFFICES

The entire top floor of the Neighbors of Woodcraft building has been selected for the West Coast Lumbermen's association headquarters when its head office is moved from Seattle to Portland. The new location will provide some 10,000 square feet of office space, according to J. R. Blunt, manager of the Portland office.

The actual moving is expected to be completed in June so that the office will be in operation July 1. The present Portland office now located in the Yeon building will probably move sooner. The association will continue its Seattle branch office after the headquarters change is effected. The Portland office which now has about 15 persons in it will be enlarged to about 30 persons after the move is made.

King Blizzard

Because of the terrific gales and high drifts associated with it, the blizzard of 1898 has always been considered the "king" of blizzards. Snow reached a depth of three feet or more in Atlantic coast states and New England and was drifted by gales of wind for several days into drifts 5, 10 and 20 feet high.

White Races
