Successful Victory Garden Needs Care And Attention Now

Success with the victory garden you have planted will depend upon the care and attention it receives from you from now on—attention to weeding while weeds are small, attention to thinning, shallow cultivation, regular watering if you irrigate, and fertilizing, according to W. B. Parker, assistant county agent.

Root crops should be thinned. Root crops produce small, misshapen roots of poor quality if they are left crowded. Suggested spacing between plants in the row: beets and carrots, 2 to 4 inches; onions, 3 inches; parsnips and salsify, 3 to 4 inches; swiss chard, 6 inches; head lettuce, 12 to 15 inches; endive, 12 inches; and mustard greens, 5 to 6 inches apart. Thin early while the plants are small to avoid disturbing the roots of the remaining plants when cultivating.

Shallow cultivation should be given to keep down weeds and to loosen the top soil following rains or irrigation. Cultivation should be just deep enough to control the weeds and loosen the top inch or inch and a half of soil. In recent years, it has been found that cultivation of growing row crops should be just deep enough to control weeds. The top soil is the richest and the best growing soil. Constant deep cultivation robs the plant of the opportunity to establish feeding roots in this rich top soil. Practice shallow cultivation in the garden just often enough to check weeds, and cultivate after rains or irrigation.

The gardener who has an adequate supply of water is fortunate. Unless water is properly applied it will do very little good. Light sprinkling every day to settle the dust will not bring results. Most vegetables require about one inch depth of water per week over the entire garden. This is equivalent to about 600 gallons of water per 1,000 square feet of garden per week.

In case of doubt as to whether the watering has been complete, dig down into the soil to find out how far the water has penetrated. The soil should be wet at least 8 to 10 inches deep at each watering. It is easy to underirrigate and equally easy to overirrigate.

If time does not permit a thorough job of watering, do not water at all, or water thoroughly a very small area at a time, then water thoroughly another small area the next time.

Keep the vegetables growing by making fertilizer applications especially where irrigation is used.

Make side row applications of fertilizer at rates of 1 to 2 pounds per 100 linear feet of row. Place the fertilizer 2 or 3 inches from the side of the row or plants or hill. Keep the fertilizer from coming in contact with the plants. The fertilizer can be placed in a shallow furrow alongside of the row and covered with soil.

Fertilizers may be used in solution by adding 1 to 2 level tablespoons to a gallon of water. One gallon will water 6 to 8 feet of row, or a pint of the solution to a single hill. Be careful of the amounts added to water.

Parker says home gardeners have repeatedly shown returns equaling one dollar per hour for every hour spent in caring for a well-planned garden.

Strand Says Vet Aid New Venture In College Field

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Present large scale educational financial aid to veterans under the G.I. bill constitutes the first great effort of our government or any other to make higher education available to a large segment of the population without regard to the economic status of those who are eligible. President A. L. Strand pointed out in connection with this year's commencement.

"Nothing like it has ever occurred before, despite the fine sentiment behind the act of 1952 which created the so-called people's colleges, of which OSC is one."

President Strand believes this venture in popular education goes deeper than a partial recompense to the veterans, and is founder on the idea that widespread knowledge and information, in addition to good intentions, make up the foundation of the American commonwealth.

"It is a pitiful illusion that good motives alone ever kept a man from the consequences of error," he declared. "Ignorance and resulting error have wrecked more lives than good motives have ever saved, for good motives without knowledge are like automobiles without brakes or steering mechanisms."

"This development has given the institutions of higher learning the greatest opportunity of their lives. Never before have they enjoyed students as seriously motivated as now. Never have enrollments as such been so unimportant in contrast to the regard for the kind of job that is being done."

"And, one should add, never was it more difficult to compete for the services of well qualified teachers. While housing of students and staff is something more than critical... it does not rank with the matter of getting and keeping the instructional staff. This, in the final analysis, has in
