Arsenic Eaters

Avert Flying Sickness

The power of color is nowhere more forcefully demonstrated than in the field of health. Color engineers have done effective work for the airlines in the prevention of "flying sickness." They discovered that browns and yellows tend to provoke nausea, while greens and blues avert it. On the advice of its experts, one air line discontinued serving mayonnaise, and at the same time changed its sheets, pillow cases and blankets in the airliner sleepers from white to green tints.

Chair Back

The shape of the back of the chair is important to comfort. A shallow curve backward between the posts prevents pressure on the spine. A spoon-handle curve rising from the seat supports the hips and allows one to lean back comfortably and still retain an alert position. A chair back that reaches a height of 32 to 38 inches from the floor is high enough to support the lower part of the shoulder blades in comfort. Higher backs look too formal and are inconvenient to use at tables and desks.

Greenland's Ice Cap

One theory on the formation of the ice cap says that Greenland was originally shaped like a pie crust, with a rim of mountains around a low central plain. Winter after winter, snow gradually filled the pie crust to overflowing. Each year's snow, pressing down on the ice cap, forces chunks around the edges to break off into the sea, forming icebergs.

Lake Shipments

Six-sevenths of the iron ore and limestone used in steel-making comes down the Great Lakes, an important water route which cannot be by-passed by movement over any other route. One-tenth of the coal mined in this country and a third of the world's grain supply follow a similar route.

Big Cities Grow

When Chicago was incorporated in 1837, the city boasted 550 inhabitants as compared with New York's 202,589 for the same period. In 1860, New York had increased to 805,658 while Chicago was still behind with 300,000 in 1870. The 1890 census showed 2,507,414 for New York and 1,089,850 for the Windy City. In 1920, the "champion" widened its margin to 5,620,048 against 2,701,705 in Chicago and according to the last official tabulation in 1940, New York was ahead by over 4 1/2 million.

Head Vegetables

Too close a trim of head vegetables such as cabbage, lettuce, broccoli, cauliflower and celery means a loss of the part that is generally richest in vitamins and minerals. It means a little extra work to make the outside parts appetizing, but the results are worth the trouble. Outside leaves must be carefully washed, and because they are not quite so tender as the inside parts, should be cut into small pieces and put into the pot a little ahead of the rest of the vegetable.

Weather Cautions

Greenland, like the Aleutians, is a weather caution. Europe's weather is influenced by Greenland's moods. The United States coast guard raided several German posts, but others managed to send their reports to Germany almost to the end of the war.

Mature on Vine

One way to save tomatoes from frost is to pull up the whole vine with the tomatoes still attached, and hang it in a dry, moderately light place, such as the garage, suggests the department of agriculture. The mature green fruits will gradually ripen on the vine, and tomatoes will keep fairly well this way for weeks.

Wash Sink
