The War Assets Administration office here said that about 100 small outbuildings suitable for moving intact would be sold by it, and the other 1700 would be in the hands of the National Public Housing Authority.

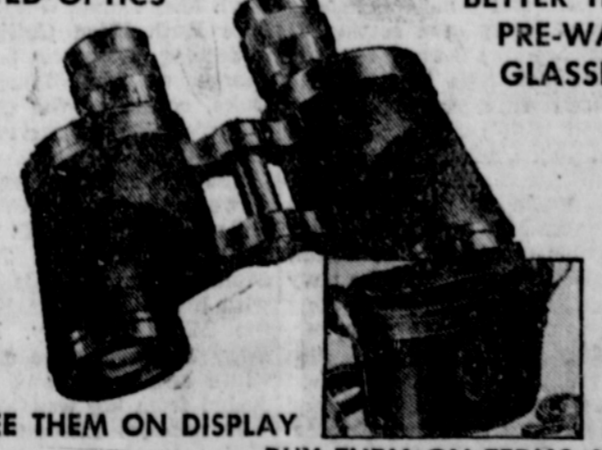
