Sen. B. K. Wheeler Is Defeated in a Montana Primary

Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, lost his bid for a fifth term in the United States Senate Tuesday in a Montana primary. Wheeler, senate chairman of the interstate commerce commission was trailing his opponent, Lief Erickson, 39, former state judge, by 4,500 votes yesterday with 669 of the 1115 precincts reported and a total vote of 38,984 votes for Erickson and 34,362 votes for Wheeler. The Montana senator was dubbed an isolationist and anti-labor.
